

The Faculty of Law organizes and implements its curriculum in accordance with the degree conferment policies established by the Faculty and the curriculum organization and implementation policies set by Kobe University, following the guidelines outlined below.

1. To cultivate a broad and deep education, comprehensive judgment, and a rich sense of humanity, general education courses are offered and to achieve the learning objectives common to all students at the University.

2. The Faculty offers specialist courses to foster deep academic knowledge and advanced specialized skills, and to achieve the learning objectives common to all students at the University as well as the learning objectives set by the Faculty.

- The Faculty offers introductory courses, courses in basic legal subjects (A) and (B), courses in advanced legal subjects, foundational legal subjects, socio-legal studies courses, international law courses, seminars, courses in applied law, and common courses so that students can acquire specialist skills that are underpinned by a broad base knowledge in law.
- The Faculty offers introductory courses, courses in political science and international relations, seminars, advanced courses in political science, and common courses so that students can acquire specialist skills that are underpinned by a broad base knowledge in political science.
- The Faculty offers foundational law courses, courses in advanced legal subjects, international law courses, courses in political science and international relations, reading texts in foreign languages, and common courses so that students can acquire the ability to respect diverse values and effectively address issues in the fields of law and political science.
- The Faculty offers foundational law courses, seminars, advanced courses in political science, advanced courses in law, and common courses so that students can acquire the ability to generate new ideas through broad and integrative thinking in order to solve complex problems.

3. Classes shall be conducted through lectures, seminars, experimental work, practical training, or a combination of these.

4. Assessment is carried out in a combined and comprehensive manner in line with the learning objectives, including through written exams, written assignments, active class participation and presentations.
